Getting Ready for Kindergarten

Developing Social/Emotional Skills at Home

- © Encourage your child to dress him/herself each morning.
- © Encourage your child to use good table manners while at the table. (Say please and thank you. Use proper utensils.)
- © Use meal time and car rides to encourage conversations
- Encourage your child to express him/herself with words. Identify how they are feeling and discuss solutions.
- Allow children to experience and resolve problems. Let them try to solve it before offering suggestions.
- © Prepare your child for transitions and routines (use a timer) so that they are not rushed
- © Practice 2 step directions. First...., then..... Ask your child to repeat the directions back to you.

Developing Academic Skills at Home

- © Read books with rich vocabulary
- Write your child's name on items
- © Play rhyming games. Pick a word and see if they can come up with a word that rhymes
- © Count items in your house, or steps as you walk
- © Go on a scavenger hunt for shapes
- © Sort items into categories- small/big, colors
- © Go on a number hunt or letter hunt around the house. Use packages, cereal boxes
- © Practice counting out loud as high as they can. By the end of Kindergarten are goal is 100 with no mistakes!
- © Encourage using playdough, scissors, clothespins, staplers to strengthen their muscles in their hands for writing
- © Read printing all around you (Signs, Foods, labels, names of family members)

How that helps at school:

Coping Skills

- Follows rules and routines
- Manages changes in activities
- © Demonstrates age appropriate self-help skills

Respects others

Expressive Language Skills

- © Communcates with peers and adults
- © Communicates personal needs
- © Seeks help to address academic needs

Receptive Language Skills

- © Listens and large and small groups
- © Follows multi-step directions

Attention and Focus

- © Sustains attention for 10-15 minutes for both adult directed and self-directed activities
- © Exhibits impulse control

How this helps at school:

- Identifies basic colors
- © Child recognized his/her name in print
- © Counts 10 objects
- © Rote counts to 100
- Identifies shapes (circle, triangle, rectangle square, hexagon)
- Understands how to hold a book
- Identifies some letters
- Holds a pencil, scissors with appropriate grasp
- Understands the sounds of some letters
