
Did YOU know that we offer the Seal of Biliteracy and the Seal of Civic Readiness at KHS?

ATTENDANCE REMINDER

All notes should be turned in prior to the start of the school day.

All absences, early dismissals and late arrivals must have a written or emailed note to be considered excused. They can be emailed to both dshort@kingstoncityschools.org AND cfisher@kingstoncityschools.org or turned in with students upon arrival at school.

*All efforts should be made to provide a written note to the Attendance Office prior to first period. All students must sign-out in the Attendance Office. If a student is returning to school, they must sign back in.

Phone calls for absences, tardies, and early excusals are not necessary, as ALL absences from school **require** written notification.

Without written notification, they are considered unexcused absences.

If a student arrives after 11 am and does not have written documentation, an administrator is called to determine whether the student may enter the building and attend class.
